1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Potti Sreeramulu Telugu University was established with the primary aim of preserving and propagating all areas of knowledge in the Telugu speaking world. This University was the product of a confluence of many institutions already working towards the promotion of Telugu culture. Thus, the Andhra Pradesh Sahitya Akademi, the Lalit Kala Akademi, the Academies of Music, Dance and Drama, the Telugu Bhasha Samiti and the International Telugu Centre which were already in existence as separate entities, were brought under one umbrella, i.e. Telugu University. This in itself makes it a unique institution since it needs to carry out all the activities of these erstwhile organizations without compromising on the standards of the university.

The University was first established as Telugu Vijnana Peetham in 1984 and on 2nd December of 1985 it emerged as a State University. In the initial phase, the university had three campuses, i.e. Rajahmundry, Srisailam and Warangal and later, in the year 1997 Siddhendra Kalapeetham, a renowned traditional training centre, dating from the 15 century of Kuchipudi came into its fold. The significance of these four campuses is that they are situated in different regions of the State, on the one hand, i.e. Telangana, Coastal Andhra and Rayalaseema; on the other hand, the Rural, Tribal and Urban. The University is a State level institution offering academic affiliation to 15 Government Music colleges from all regions of the State.

Telugu University was accredited with 'B' grade by NAAC in the year 2013.

Vision

The vision of this university is to preserve and rejuvenate Telugu culture in all spheres. This institution was established combining the existing institutions which were working for the glory of Telugu culture in various fields like music, dance, literature, painting and drama. The vision of this university was to make these areas of culture accessible to every aspiring youth through courses leading to degrees; and to preserve the glory of the bygone days of Telugu culture, History, language and literature through research and publications.

- The students this university seeks to serve are from all over the state, from the marginalized sections of rural and tribal backgrounds.
- This institution was established to cater to the propagation of Telugu language, literature, fine and performing arts. The main aim was to bring these cultural fields which were confined to the elite, ie. Classical dance, Carnatic music, Painting, Sculpture, Theatre to the grass root level. Hence, it envisaged many courses like degree, P.G, certificate, diploma, P.G diploma and kalapravesika for the convenience of the students hailing from different backgrounds.

Mission

This is a Language University with a unique nature. It is established with a vision to preserve, promote, uphold, and upgrade Language, Culture, History, Literature and Arts of the Telugu people.

Mission

1. To empower students in different fields through courses in basic and advanced studies in art, culture, music, drama, dance, painting, sculpture, architecture, history, language, literature, linguistics and journalism.
 1. To function as a high level research centre in Telugu language, History, Culture, literature and Arts
 2. To impart training to those residing within and outside India who study Telugu language, literature and Culture
 3. To develop Telugu as a language of modern knowledge and medium of instruction
 4. To facilitate national integration through Arts, translations and publication of texts from Telugu into other languages and vice-versa.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

University caters to the needs of the students mostly from the rural areas in the state and offers programs in Fine Arts, Visual and Performing Arts in a holistic manner. The use of traditional expertise is combined with modern learning tools in the field of performing and visual arts. The university is a resource centre for State Official Language Telugu. The encyclopedia brought out by the University, the Museum “Telugu through the ages”, the documentaries produced on stalwarts of Telugu culture by the AVR division. This University has unique departments of Lexicography and Encyclopedia.

Telugu University caters to the regional language media, which is the most dynamic area of social transformation in the present days. Mass communication, TV Journalism, Film Direction, Anchoring, Carnatic Music, Dance Forms like Kuchipudi and Andhranatyam are some of the courses taught here. At the same time, traditional arts such as Harikatha, Padyanatakam, Lalita Sangeetam and Yakshaganam are also given academic stature in the form of Diplomas and Certificates. No other institution in the State teaches these traditional arts. This is the first University in this country to introduce Astrology courses at Masters and Doctors level since the inception of the University.

The University has a very active publication division and an audio visual division which have published classics in Telugu literature and text books etc., and produced documentaries on renowned personalities. The University works towards preservation, propagation, promotion and advancement of Telugu language, literature, art and culture.

Institutional Weakness

Infrastructural facilities for students, especially, women can be much better. Women’s hostel is an immediate

necessity which could improve intake of women students. As most of the students joining in this university are from the rural and weaker sections, adequate support is needed from all fronts.

Lack of sufficient class-rooms is also a drawback. The present accommodation though being utilized optimally is insufficient in view of the demand for class rooms.

Apart from class rooms University needs to find proper accommodation for teachers. There is a lack of sports facilities to students both indoor, outdoor apart from rest area facilities for women students, woman teachers and separate staff room for female teachers. These are all needed for the overall development of students and the institution.

Insufficient faculty: Though all the departments have senior teachers they would be retiring in a few years. At present, not a single department has a desirable ratio of Professor, Associate Professor and Asst. Professor (1:2:4). This faculty ratio has made the university ineligible for tapping research grants from agencies like UGC.

The Library and other learning resources which should be an integral part of any University also lack sufficient space and infrastructure.

Institutional Opportunity

At a time when globalization and the proliferation of media is leaving several art forms and artisan families on the verge of its extinction, as envisaged in its objectives, the University has risen to the occasion by preserving art forms, culture and literature.

The fact that students from artisan communities are eager to learn and keep art forms alive, the University has to provide them opportunities on par with other national level institutions. This University gives scope for study and research purely in mother tongue. This certainly improves and gives the students an added advantage in their thought process and research work.

The government's decision to impart art education at school level and college level has opened up new window of opportunity to the students of arts and culture. It is the responsibility of the university to provide necessary skills to the students so that they can be employed and also do their best to preserve the culture and art forms.

Institutional Challenge

As the career orientation among students and their parents is increasing day by day, there is always a danger of students opting courses like engineering and allied subjects. Despite this, our University still finds parents and students who are interested in taking-up fine arts, social sciences and humanities as their career.

As languages are becoming endangered due to globalisation, the University established a motto to promote, propagate and preserve Telugu language, literature and culture at the national and international levels.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The subjects and programs offered in this University are unique; the curriculum pertains to Language, Literature, Culture and Arts. It is also a blend of tradition with contemporary curriculum in Arts, Dance, Drama, Theatre, Painting, Sculpture and Music.

The University has introduced Choice Based Credit System for the PG Courses in the year 2014-15. Accordingly the syllabus was revised. The courses of Kuchipudi, Andhranatyam, Music, Journalism, Theatre Arts and Folk Arts focus on skill development and employability. The feedback pertaining to the syllabus is received from students, teachers and parents and is revised in tune with the UGC stipulated regulations. Student internship also forms part of the syllabi for certain courses like MCJ where students need to undergo internship in any media organisation for about a month's time especially during summer vacation. The University has introduced new courses in M.A. Program in Jyothisham, Telugu, M.Phil. Program in Jyothisham, Folk and Tribal lore and Telugu.

The University is also offering some value added short term courses in Digital Marketing and certificate course in Computer Applications. The University offers UG, PG and Research programs apart from Diplomas, P.G Diplomas and Certificate programs. The unique quality of the courses offered here is that most of them are not offered anywhere else in the State. (for instance Padyanatakam – Traditional Theatre, Mimicry, Bhakti Sangeetam, Light Music, Andhra Natyam and Perini Natyam).

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The main objective of the courses offered in Fine Arts and Performing Arts by the institution is to train students in that particular field. The teachers of this University are recruited both for their academic excellence and their experiential talent. The combination of academic expertise with traditionally inherited originality ensures professional teaching which ultimately benefits the students.

Most of the teachers hold Ph.D. and the teaching learning method adopted by them includes lectures, interactive sessions, project based and computer assisted learning.

There are two internal assessment exams for each semester for both UG and PG Courses. The weightage for examinations would be 20% for internal and 80% for the external examination. The evaluation of the exam scripts and practicals would be both by the internal and external evaluators. The students' performance is assessed through Seminars and viva. Special classes are arranged for slow learners. Since the courses in the University are seldom impersonal, the relationship between teacher and student borders companionship.

The teaching faculty also keeps itself abreast of the changes and needs of the market, the latest developments in that subject so that the learning process is always on the path of growth. The teacher student equation is conducive for personal attention.

The faculty is well established in their respective fields and are also widely recognized by the community and other educational institutions. Many teachers from these disciplines have been awarded and honoured by the Government for their contribution.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The thrust area of this University is research in Telugu Language, Literature, History, Folk Arts, Tribal lore and Performing Arts. The University provides seed money to the teachers working in Warangal Campus for carrying out the Regional Resources for Centre for Folk life Project (RRCF). The University has JRF-SRF, RGNF, URF and Post Doctoral Fellowships for the students.

The University has a Museum entitled **Telugu Through the Ages** and also has an **Audio-Video Recording Division**. Some of the faculties have research projects sanctioned by Govt. Agencies. The University conducted a seminar on **'Intellectual Property Rights'**. The University has well defined research policy and has constituted University Research Committee which guides the students and faculty. The institution has won two awards for Excellence in Education. The NSS students have been actively participating in extension activities specially focusing on social awareness and holistic development. The University has entered into MoUs with Siliconandhra (Milipitas, USA), Telugu Association of Malaysia, Mahatma Gandhi University, Nalgonda and City College, Hyderabad.

The publication wing publishes academic, reference and some informative books in Telugu language on subjects like social justice, human rights, women's issues etc. at reasonable prices.

The University's Extension Services Division continues the activities of different Akademies of the State like Sahitya Akademi, Lalitha Kala Akademi, Sangeeta Nataka Akademi etc.,. This involves conducting Memorial Lectures, honouring stalwarts from different fields, providing financial assistance, railway concession to artistes, overseeing all the cultural activities of the university etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The Potti Sreeramulu Telugu University has in total seven campuses, three within the city of Hyderabad and four spread over in two Telugu speaking States, Telangana and Andhra Pradesh.

The University has four hostels for boys and one hostel at Kuchipudi for girls. These are maintained with good infrastructure, computer facility, mess and medical facility.

The main campus at Hyderabad has an Auditorium, a Museum, a Conference Hall and a Graphic workshop, Theatre Studio, Audio Video Studio and Computer Cell acting as Central facility, a Reading Room-cum-Library and Departmental Libraries in addition to the class rooms.

The maintenance of the infrastructure is done by the Engineering section of the University. The General library, situated in a satellite campus of the University is a full-fledged, self-sufficient entity with a lakh of books,

micro-reader, computer wing with internet facility, CDs and DVDs, Archive section, volumes of old and rare magazines. It is open and accessible to the faculty and students for 12 hours a day.

The Library is equipped with Infonet/Inflibnet facility. The University is making optimum use of its space to accommodate regular courses, evening courses and distance education courses.

All the Departments/Centres of the university have computers, LCDs, OHPs for use in class room/seminars.

Student Support and Progression

Students of this institution have facilities like - freeship, scholarships, URF and RGNF fellowships. Students have hostel facility, access to health facility and a multi-faceted library which provides them with material for not only their subjects but for competitive examinations too.

Students are benefited by remedial coaching in English. Coaching classes are conducted for NET examinations and Government competitive examinations. Students can approach for redress of grievances through Dean, Students' Affairs, Chief Warden and Wardens of the hostels. There is an Anti-Ragging Cell which monitors activities of students and their relationships helping to prevent ragging in any form.

The following capability enhancement and development schemes are available to the students:

1. Guidance for Competitive Exams
2. Remedial Coaching
3. Yoga and Meditation
4. Personal Counseling

The University has established International Students Cell in the year 2016 which caters to the needs of the International Students.

The University has a transparent mechanism to redress grievances of students.

With emphasis laid on cultural heritage, the students have actively participated in the cultural, literary and other extension activities.

The Alumni of this university consists of great stalwarts and established professional artistes in their respective fields, such as Carnatic Music, Kuchipudi Dance, Television, Cinema, News Media, Folk, and Sculpture. The students regularly take part in various activities of NSS apart from participating in youth festivals.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Vice-Chancellor is the Chief Executive Officer of the University and the Registrar is the Administrative Head. The organizational structure is decentralized with responsibilities of each department or division is clearly etched. The Executive Council is Principal Executive Body of the University, whereas the Academic Senate is the Principal Academic Body.

The University has an IQAC which caters to the quality assurance of the University. It has University Research Committee, Central Admission Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Library Committee, Equal Opportunity Cell and Women Grievances Cell etc.

The University provides certain welfare measures to the teaching and non-teaching staff viz. House Building Loans, Vehicle Loans etc. The University conducts professional development / administrative training programmes for teaching and non-teaching staff.

The Accounts of the University are audited regularly by L.F and A.G. Audit. The Block Grant is sanctioned by the State Govt., whereas the UGC and RUSA release developmental assistance grant. The Financial management includes budget allocation to the departments/centres as per their requirements. Obtaining grants from donors and other avenues including fees through Distance Education and sales of books are the primary resources of the University. Auditing of accounts is regularly done.

The University has a Women Grievance Cell which addresses the Grievance of the Women staff. The University has been conducting Seminars and Workshops on Gender sensitization.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The University is functioning as per its Act and Statutes. The institution strives for quality education which is achieved through good selection of teachers, encouraging originality and creativity in the students and regular updating of the curriculum.

The university, on its part, includes the stake holders in all its deliberations and decision-making, thus ensuring all round quality of education in tune with global needs.

Awareness to the dynamics of these societal aspects, has led the university to recently introduce a Regional Studies' Centre and a Women Studies Centre. The General Grievance Cell, Women's Cell, Equal Opportunities Cell and Student Welfare Cell guarantee social and gender indiscrimination in the functioning of the University.

Initiatives like digging rain water harvesting pits to preserve water are being implemented. Celebrating important days such as Biodiversity Day, International Water Day, World Environmental Day, Vanamahotsav Week towards environmental awareness has been a regular feature. The University under Haritha Haram programme planted saplings. Similarly, the University is also discouraging the Plastic Bags.

The University has been organizing appropriate activities to increase consciousness about national identities and symbols. It is also organizing activities connected with promotion of universal values, national Values and national integrity. Stressing the importance of vote, the University has been regularly observing National Voters Day.

The Courses in Department of Communication and Journalism aim at developing social responsibility of the students. Media as the Fourth Estate has a responsible role to play in ensuring social citizenship and the students of these courses are equipped to work towards this ideal through all forms of media viz. print, electronic and new media.

The Fine Arts and Performing Arts are self-conducive by themselves in promoting and propagating human values and sensitivities. The courses in Fine Arts and Performing Arts actively motivate in creating awareness.

The Department of Folk Arts trains its students to use folk art forms in spreading social message (child labour, gender sensitisation) in remote areas of the state.

The Department of Theatre Arts promotes the use of theatre by training the students to write, direct and enact on themes of social issues. Performances in the Theatre Arts often portray Women's issues in various formats like street theatre and environment theatre.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The courses offered by the institution in Music, Dance, Fine Arts and Theatre Arts, the main objective is to train students in the particular fields. The students come from different backgrounds. Among these some students who have no background of the traditional arts take some time in mastering them. In these cases the teachers take special classes.

- In the Departments of Performing and Visual arts, (Dance, Theatre, Music, Painting and Sculpture) the practice sessions/practical classes give an indication of the slow learner as against the advanced learner. In other courses seminars and internal assignments indicate the quality of the learner. Special classes are provided for those who are not able to keep up pace with others.
- The advanced learner is encouraged to perform in front of renowned artistes in their field from time to time (especially during special occasions such as Music Day, Theatre Day etc) so that they will gain knowledge as well as encouragement from them.
- In the Department of Linguistics the slow learners are identified through slip tests and assignments and they are supplied with handouts to coop with the subjects.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

- Teaching–learning methods adopted by the faculty members include Lecture Method, Interactive Method, Project-based Learning, Computer-assisted Learning, Experiential Learning etc. The Teaching – learning activities are made effective through illustration and special lectures.
- Eighty percent of the courses focus on experiential learning including practical and work experience. The curriculum equips the students to achieve self-sustainability through developing their talents.
- The creative talent of the students is encouraged in these practical classes; for instance, the Department of Theatre Arts includes in its curriculum a unit for the students to write, produce and direct stage plays and Television plays. This gives them hand-on experience in the field.
- The students are also encouraged to participate in the cultural activities conducted by the University on different occasions. Thus paving way for them to hone-up their skills.
- This being a university to promote culture and Arts in the main, most of the courses are practical-oriented. While the Fine and Performing Art departments incorporate performances in the curriculum, the Department of Communications and Journalism gives practical training in Print Media and Electronic Media.
- The faculty members foster learning environment by engaging in rich experiential content of teaching through experience, Teaching through demonstration, visual aids, Organizing exhibitions, Presenting papers and holding seminars.
- Interaction of students with Faculty and Guest Professors during regular lectures
- Changes in Curriculum taking into consideration students’ feedback
- Paper presentation by students in Seminars
- Students’ direction and production of plays in the Department of Theatre Arts
- Folk Arts students’ performances in social awareness programmes
- Participation of students in Inter-collegiate competitions
- Publications of students’ papers in university magazine
- To make the research scholars to equip with teaching experience, the University giving them an opportunity to take some classes. They are also entrusted with invigilation duties. Apart from teaching and invigilation duties the students are also actively involved in organising Seminars and Workshops.

- The students' evaluation in this University is a continuous process. Their performance is evaluated through slip tests, assignments, performances, semester end exams.
- For the U.G. and P.G courses, there are two internal assessment exams per semester within three months and before semester exams.
- The Internal assessment would be for 20 % and the External examination marks for 80%.

- For the M.Phil and Ph.D students, the course is for one Semester. The Part I exam of M.Phil is for a maximum marks of 300 (3 papers) and the Pre-Ph.D. course is for a maximum marks of 200 (2 papers).
- For all PG courses double evaluation (one internal and one external) practice is in vogue for last several years.
- For the Diploma, P.G. Diploma and Certificate Courses there is only external and annual evaluation
- The external examination is held after completing the prescribed days of instruction.
- For this the model papers, syllabus and external examiners lists are provided by the Departments to the examination branch.
- The syllabus and model question papers are sent to the External Examiner. The question papers sent by them are modified if and when necessary by the Heads of the concerned Departments.
- The examination date is decided only after the syllabus is completed. The decision of date is taken after it is discussed by the Heads of the departments under the chairmanship of the Head of the Institution.
- After the exams are completed, the answer papers are first coded and sent for external evaluation.
- Later internal evaluation takes place for those where double evaluation is implemented. If the difference between these two evaluations is less than 20% the average of both the marks plus the internal assessment marks is declared as the final marks. Where the difference between external and internal evaluation is more than 20% a third evaluation is done. After receiving these marks, the highest two awarded marks are taken into consideration for taking average.
- In the final stage the answer papers are decoded and result announced.
- The evaluation method is transparent and flexible. The student is provided continuous assessment so that he can improve with each examination.
- The student has the opportunity to go for improvement, ask for recounting if not satisfied with the result and complete the course in double the stipulated time (2 year course in 4 years)

The University was established with the main objective of promoting Telugu Language, Literature and Culture. One of the basic objective of the university is to function as a high level research centre in Telugu Language, Literature and Culture, which is clearly stated in the Act of the University. The Act is uploaded in the University website.

To monitor the research activities in the university, established a University Research Committee (URC). The University has declared every Friday as 'Research Day'. On this day the research scholars will interact URC members.

Archives: The University houses an Archives where the documentation of Folk and Triballore is preserved at School of Folk and Triballore at Warangal campus.

Lab: Lab room is available for the students of History and Archaeology.

Art Gallery: The University has an Art Gallery for conducting Art Exhibitions.

Library: The Library of the University is located at Vidyanagar in the premises of Telugu Bhavan. The Library has a wide and varied range of books on subjects like literature, language, arts, history and social sciences. It has a separate room with computers equipped with internet facility for the use of students and staff.

Chitravani Studio: The University has an Audio-Video recording studio for recording, editing with high end equipment.

Computer Cell: This cell not only confines in providing facilities to the students and staff of the University, but also caters to the needs of the community by conducting certificate courses.

Graphic Workshop: The University has a Graphic Workshop which facilitates outside artists to work in this workshop to hone-up their skills. Following facilities are provided in the graphic workshop.

Criterion 6 - Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of an effective leadership in tune with the vision and mission of the University

Response:

- The organizational structure is decentralized with responsibilities of each department or division clearly etched.
- The Vice-Chancellor is the academic head of the University. All the policy decisions will be taken by the Vice-Chancellor with the approval of the Executive Council.
- The Registrar, as the administration head, oversees the organizational functioning.
- The Finance Officer is the statutory officer of the University who looks after the financial matters.
- The hierarchy of both academic and administrative structure is such that the Deans and Directors and Officers of the University need to lead from the front and the university takes care that the people in higher positions possess leadership qualities.
- The Heads of the department co-ordinate and monitor the work of the department under the guidance of the Deans of the respective schools.
- The Directors of the Centre monitors the work of the Centre.
- The Research Committee monitors the smooth progress of research work in coordination with the Heads, Directors and Deans.
- The IQAC coordinates with the Heads, Directors and Deans regarding UGC projects, academic affairs, research etc., to maintain the quality.
- The Controller of Examination monitors the examination process in coordination with the Heads, Directors and Deans.
- The Central Admission Committee monitors the process of admissions coordinating with the Department Heads and Directors of Centres.

6.1.2 The institution practices decentralization and participative management

Response:

- Vice-Chancellor is the Chief Executive Officer of the University who functions in accordance with the provisions of AP Universities Act 1991.
- Vice-Chancellor is the Chairman of the Executive Council, the highest authority for all decisions of the University.
- Vice-Chancellor is assisted by several designated officers such as Deans, Registrar, Directors of Centres, Controller of Examinations, Heads of the Departments besides several other administrative officers like Finance Officer and Deputy Registrars.
- The University leadership functions through a process of democratic decentralization. The Vice-chancellor delegates academic, administrative and financial powers to its various units.
- Rotation system is followed in appointing teachers to the statutory academic and administrative positions such as Head of the Department, Chairman, Board of Studies and Deans of Faculty on the

basis of seniority.

- Senior teachers are involved in the administrative positions such as Registrar, Principals, Controller of Examination, Director of Admissions, UGC Coordinating Officer, Director-CDE and others.
- In all meetings of academic nature, the Vice-chancellor holds meetings periodically with the Heads, Directors and Deans before taking a decision.
- The Teachers have an Association which discusses the proposals and decisions concerning the faculty in the General Body Meetings and represents these resolutions to the Higher Authorities.
- Any decision regarding the curriculum, courses, programmes are discussed in the Departmental committees and Board of Studies in which the faculty is involved.
- All problems concerning courses or students are discussed by the vice-chancellor with the faculty and a collective decision is arrived at in finding solutions.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Perspective/Strategic plan and Deployment documents are available in the institution

Response:

This institution needs better infrastructure to find its full strength and achieve its aims and objectives. Hence, the main thrust is to develop infrastructure suitable for carrying out all the activities of the University. The University in the recent years received the development grant of Rs. 20 Crores from the state Government. In this direction the University has started the construction of Open Air Theatre, Ladies Hostel and New Administrative Building. These constructions will be completed in a couple of months.

- The University with the recent funds earmarked by the RUSA like to develop the infrastructure facilities.
- The strength of the university lies in its diversity of subjects which needs specialists in those areas. The focus would be on recruiting new talent in the diverse fields of instruction.
- The priority of the University is to promote contemporary relevant research in the University. The University research committee monitors research activity in the University.
- As the university deals with Fine Arts and Performing Arts, which have no boundaries of nation, more collaboration with External Institutions are to be sought for a holistic approach to the subjects. The University has entered into Siliconandhra, America for conducting Certificate Courses in Telugu, Dance and Music.
- The main objective of this University is to further develop Telugu as a language suitable for all areas of knowledge and help other institutions in enhancing its use in technical and scientific subjects. For this, studies in the form of research programmes, collaborations and projects are being taken up. It is intended to develop computer applications for modernization of Telugu language.
- The above objectives will be carried out through co-ordination with all the Departments and Centres of the University.

1. The Dean shall be the Head of the School and shall be responsible for the conduct and maintenance of the standards of research in the School. The Dean shall also have such other functions as may be prescribed.
 2. The Dean shall have the right to be present and to speak at any meeting of the Board of studies or Committee of the Schools, as the case may be, but shall not have the right to vote there at unless he is a member thereof.

VICE-CHANCELLOR

The Vice-chancellor shall hold office for a term of three years from the date of his appointment and shall be eligible for reappointment to that office for another term of three years in the manner provided. The Vice-Chancellor shall be paid such pay and allowances as may, by order be specified by the Government from time to time. He/She shall be provided with a furnished official accommodation for which he/she shall pay ten percent of his/her salary towards rent. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Chancellor to see that the provisions of this Act, the statutes, ordinances and regulations are duly observed and he/she may exercise all powers necessary for his/her purpose.

THE REGISTRAR

The Registrar shall be the ex-officio Secretary of the Executive Council and the Academic Senate, but shall not be deemed to be a member of any of those authorities. He/She is the custodian of the records, the common seal and such other property of the University as the Executive Council shall commit to his/her

charge. He/She can issue all notices convening meetings of the Executive Council, the Academic Senate and the Boards of Studies or any Committees appointed by the authorities of the University.

FINANCE OFFICER

The Finance Officer shall be the ex-officio Secretary of the Finance Committee, but shall not be deemed to be a member of such Committee. Exercises general supervision over the funds of the University and shall maintain the accounts of the University; and shall advise it as regards its financial policy; and perform such other financial functions as may be assigned to him by the Executive Council or as may be prescribed by these statutes or the ordinances.

- The University receives Block Grant from the State Govt. and General Development Grant from UGC.
- The Block Grant is for payment of Salaries of the Staff and maintenance of other heads. The General Development Grant is utilized for the specific purposes i.e. for the purchase of Books, Equipments, Appointment of Visiting Fellows, Organizing Seminars and workshops, Construction of Buildings, Travel Grants etc.
- The University has the following internal resources.

 - Donations received from philanthropists
- The resources so generated are utilized for conducting festivals, cultural events, honouring scholars etc.
- To some extent the internal resources are utilized for maintenance of infrastructure and learning resources.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

- To ensure efficiency in academic and administrative practices, decentralization of administration is being practiced. The Departmental Committees, the Research Committee, the Student Welfare Centre are all part of this exercise.
- The University tries to create internal financial resources through Distance Education courses and a few self-finance courses.
- Students from the disadvantaged sections of the society are provided with financial assistance, special training and many other concessions so that they can pursue the course of their choice.
- The students from the rural and tribal area have access of gaining knowledge in this institution as the medium of instruction is Telugu, a language of their competence.
- The University provides special assistance to the faculty and students through General Grievance cell, Women Cell, SC/ST Cell, Student Welfare Cell.
- The University honours the staff and students who received achievements in their respective field in both academic and social pursuits.
- The University academic staff has a Co-operative credit society through which the members receive loans at meagre interest.
- The University provides loans for both teaching and non-teaching for vehicles and houses.
- The University offers Medical Insurance scheme to the employees which takes care of their health.
- It offers many options for students in choosing the courses.
- It encourages students to participate in inter-university festivals.
- It honors students who have contributed to the success of these festivals and won the prizes.
- It encourages students to conduct seminars (especially on specific days like Dr. B.R. Ambedkar's Birth Anniversary etc) on their own.
- It gives opportunity to students to perform along with their teachers and in the presence of stalwarts in their specific arts.
- It provides students with a wide range of books, computers with internet, micro-film facilities and reference books for various courses and competitive exams.
- It offers encouragement for students to be creative and helps them in finding out their inner potential.
- It showcases the creative works of the students like displaying of paintings and sculptures in the premises of the university to encourage even better work.
- This University's main mission is to cater to the educational needs of the marginalized sections of the society across the State. Since it has mostly unconventional courses, it includes the backward sections, who have never been introduced into such areas of culture.
- Unlike other Universities of the State, this University has campuses in the rural, backward and tribal areas (Srisailam, Warangal, Kuchipudi) where youth have little access to the courses. The students from these areas are invariably from economically weaker sections for whom, the University is offering expensive courses like Dance, Music, Theatre, Painting and Sculpture.

6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations

and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms**Response:**

- Every year a Prospectus Committee is formed with senior faculty members. They formulate the teaching, learning evaluation schedule and the academic calendar for that particular year.
- M.A and M.Phil in Telugu, Linguistics, History and Communication and Journalism, M.Phil in Comparative Literature predominantly use the lecture method.
- M.P.A. in Dance, Music, Theatre Arts, Folk Arts; B.F.A. in Painting and Sculpture use other methods like practical, workshops besides theory.
- Even in the Lecture method, seminars and class work such as translations are used for class room interaction.
- Interaction of students with Faculty and Guest Faculty is encouraged during regular lectures.
- The students' feedback is also considered while making changes in the curriculum.
- Paper presentation by students in Seminars.
- Innovative assignments like students' direction and production of plays in the Department of Theatre Arts, students' performances in social awareness programmes by Folk Arts.
- Participation of students in Inter-collegiate competitions.
- Publication of students' papers in University journal is encouraged.
- The major programmes like Fine Arts and Performing Arts in this University are unique in nature, which are more practical oriented, rather than theoretical. Hence in place of tutorials the after-college hours are taken up for rehearsals, especially for Fine Arts and Visual Arts (painting and sculpture).
- Linguistics, Comparative Literature, English and Sanskrit have mainly research programmes which require supervisor-scholar interaction beyond college hours.
- Departmental seminar libraries are upgraded with latest books.
- Participation of students and faculty in seminars and workshops of departments and other universities.
- Internet Browsing is available for both faculty and students to update and upgrade their knowledge with the recent developments in the subject.
- The faculty upgrades their knowledge on concerned subjects through Refresher and Orientation courses.
- Special lectures are organized by the University for the benefit of both students and teachers by inviting experts to talk on contemporary issues. For instance, in most of the Endowment Lectures (5 per year) the topic is carefully selected to reflect the contemporary issues.

In addition of these objectives, it has inherited certain responsibilities related to culture and fine arts from the erstwhile academies.

The University is accomplishing its vision by offering different fine art courses. By honouring the scholars it is committed to the cause of culture and literature, which was the onus of the erstwhile academies.

Apart from the regular programmes of teaching and learning, the centres and divisions of the University carryout activities of distinct nature.

As this university is a confluence of various erstwhile institutions like Sahitya, Sangeeta, Nataka, Lalita kala, Nritya academies, it has retained most of the activities of those institutions. These are conducted by the Extension Services Division of the University. These include the following activities:

- Extending financial assistance to writers for publishing their works in various literary genres
- Railway concessions to Cultural Troupes to visit and perform in other parts of the country
- Providing Art Gallery for artistes to exhibit their paintings
- Recognition through awards to talented and creative people in various fields, such as literature, language, dance, music, painting, sculpture and folk arts.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

In addition to teaching the University has the following unique departments and centres.

Dept. of Lexicography: It prepares lexicons, corpora, designs dictionaries to the current needs of the society and takes up research projects.

Centre for Preparation of Encyclopaedia: This centre prepares encyclopaedias of all branches of human knowledge through Indian language, Telugu.

Publication Division: Publication division publishes Telugu classics, rare books, dictionaries, books on social concerns etc. It brings out the Telugu translations of the complete works and speeches of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar.

Extension Services Division: This University is a confluence of various erstwhile academies and the activities of these institutions are carried out by this division. ESD extends financial assistance to writers for publishing their works, besides honouring the scholars.

International Telugu Centre: The University caters to the needs of Telugu students living in other States and abroad by providing text books and other materials. It works in collaboration with Telugu Associations in other countries to provide material for young children to develop their language capabilities. The syllabus and examinations conducted by the university will enable them to take up advanced studies in Telugu at a later stage. Foreign students interested in learning Telugu are provided a platform in the form of diploma and certificate courses and training camps. Schools from other States follow the syllabus and textbooks prepared by the Telugu University in teaching Telugu as Second and Third Language. ITC conducts World Telugu Conferences in and outside the country, also organizing National Conferences of repute.

Concluding Remarks :

University functions in accordance with the provisions of the Act. It has a well defined organisational structure and the responsibilities are decentralised paving way for transparency both in academic and administration.

Aims and objectives of the University are carried out through teaching, research, publication and extension activities.

The unique feature of this University to provide higher education in mother tongue i.e. Telugu. The medium of instruction in the disciplines like Linguistics, History, Journalism, Jyothisham is Telugu.

The Centre for Comparative Studies offers research courses that aim at national integration and useful for understanding the cultural and literary diversity of the world. The thrust area of the centre is comparison of other languages with Telugu.

University focuses at cultural integration through various performing arts like Dance, Music, Theatre and Fine

Arts. These disciplines hitherto have been more accessible to the elite. The University offers these courses to the students at grass root level to bring out the inherent talent hidden in them which provides self-sustenance. The SCs, STs, OBCs and women form approximately 80% of the total student population of the University.

As the University is unconventional in nature, it strives to achieve a balance between the uniqueness of its courses and the existing market needs. Most of the courses in performing arts and fine arts are practical-oriented, while the Department of Communication and Journalism gives practical training in print and electronic media. The curriculum is so designed which helps the students in skill development, employability and entrepreneurship.
